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RIVER CRUISE, Cheryl Beckett



Our tour began on arrival in Amsterdam two days early. We were met at the airport by Viking guides and taken to our hotel. There, a Viking concierge guided us on a tour of the "hot spots" of Amsterdam such as the Van Gogh Museum. Canal tours, other museums and the "red light district" (yes, we did) consumed us for two funfilled days. But when 5 o'clock came on Saturday we were boarded and head out to places beyond for a 14-day lifetime adventure on the "high seas" ... not really, but I will get to that later. It didn't take too many days onboard for us to realize that 14 days weren't going to be enough.

188 guests from English-speaking countries had the same idea: unpack, relax, and enjoy the efforts of professional tourist organizers as they planned our daily excursions and our superb gourmet cuisine. The eating decadence was savored by all, but food won't be the topic here, other than to say-wine, beer and desserts at lunch and dinner are not our norm, and the consequences (to our hips) linger on. So ... departing from Amsterdam in the midst of Gay Pride weekend and canal parade to the windmills of Kinderdijk our first 24 hours onboard began. At our first stop and every one thereafter tour guides gave us informative, interesting facts and perspective on local history and culture. Since we were in groups of 20 or fewer there were ample opportunities to take photos and get answers for "inquiring minds."

Next stop, Cologne, Germany. where we were guided to the spectacular Gothic cathedral. Then we proceeded on the Middle Rhine to Koblenz. Our "boat guide" gave us notes on

the history of castles and vineyards as well as their history which enhanced our appreciation of the preservation of man's amazing achievements. (Of course none of us could pass a test on the info.) We saw several UNESCO sites during our tour. Our itinerary included guided tours and free time in Nuremberg, Vienna, Passau, Melk, Krems, Bratislava, and the grand culmination—Budapest.



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"Breathtaking" would justly describe the amazement and intensity of our entering Budapest at midnight with its ambience of dancing lights, wheeling flocks of birds and crowds of people on bridges passing shops. We knew then that our guides had saved the best for last. Truly a lifetime memory. What pictures!

We were moved to another ship on the seventh day so we could continue our adventure.

Ralph's Review Clubhouse Re-landscaping

It looks like the weather will stay with us for a while so we can continue working on the clubhouse landscaping. Re-landscaping the front of the clubhouse may not look or seem like a huge task; however, when considering the infrastructure needs, including new wiring and lighting, a trench under the ramp to relocate natural gas-line and complete regrading for proper drainage and setting all the huge stones, it is a big project. We anticipate completion on the hardscape by the end of the first week of November.

In addition, we are going to use the Colorado Buff stones to update and tie in several of the landscape corner beds between the entry and the clubhouse. Ryan and Kali will be doing this work. Please give them plenty of room while they are working around the clubhouse and drive slowly while they are working on the entry drive and roadsides.

Fall Clean Up

With an in-house maintenance or field crew of only two who have been working hard most of the summer on the irrigation system, mowing the golf course and doing numerous landscape projects including the clubhouse, we have no one to do the fall clean up. The Board of Directors recently approved clean up being done by a landscape contractor. We are reviewing bids from several contractors one of whom may ultimately be our landscape maintenance service provider. At this point leaf clean up will begin the first week of November

and occur as conditions require. Gutter cleaning will begin when most of the leaves are

Well #2

We recently had the 100-plus feet of well #2 videoed to determine over-all conditions of the well casing. For the most part, it is in good condition. The problem that the video showed is small rocks coming through the perforations of the PVC well-casing. This is consistent with the ongoing problems we have experienced with this well and well meter. We are obtaining final information and proposals to reline the well with pipe that has smaller perforations and install a new pump and motor.

Winter

We know that snow will be here before long. Community-wide snow plowing costs \$800 to \$1000 per plowing. It's a difficult call to make with the budget allowing for only five to seven plows for the season, when reasonable, particularly early and late winter plowing may not occur. When plowing is required: please yield to snow removal equipment at all times, giving them plenty of room.

Giving Thanks

As much as we were thankful for all the rain this spring, it put our service providers and consequently Adriel Hills sixty days behind on summer projects. We have accomplished a tremendous amount of work in a shorter window than in years past. Frankly, it has been quite the push! I am extremely grateful for the patience and understanding each of you has extended while we have worked through projects. This summer's work was completed only due to the persistence and professionalism of our service providers, including carpenters, painters, and many others.

My heartfelt thanks also applies to Bonita, Kali, and Ryan who have each had their hands full since spring. The crew and I are extremely thankful for the opportunity to work in this outstanding community. We truly appreciate the tremendous support and thoughtfulness from so many of you! Considerate Neighbors

I think we would all agree that Adriel Hills is a beautiful, peaceful and supportive community to live in and we all want to be considerate neighbors. Despite that, there are times when any one of us can unknowingly and unintentionally do something that is insensitive to others around us. In those cases, most of us would want to be made aware of the behavior so that we may change it. None of us is looking to get into an argument or dispute. In light of that I'd like to suggest how we can communicate in a respectful and sensitive manner.

When bringing up a potentially sensitive issue with your neighbor, do so in a calm, relaxed manner, both in body-language and voice. It is often helpful to stand beside your neighbor rather than face-to-face. We are hard-wired to perceive head-on posture as aggressive.

Acknowledge that you do not believe the behavior in question was done deliberately and that your neighbor—like you—wants to get along and maintain a harmonious relationship and that he or she was not aware that it was bothering you and/or not in compliance with Adriel Hills' Rules and Regulations.

With that atmosphere of mutuality established, you can describe the *specific* behavior and how it affects you. Generalizations really aren't effective in communicating. For example, you night say, "Monday night at eleven o'clock your music was loud enough to keep me from sleeping and I have work in the morning."

Try not to belabor your point. End it by thanking your neighbor for their attention and for taking the time to listen to your concerns so that you can continue to enjoy friendly relations.

I hope the above helps us to continue enjoying living here in beautiful Adriel Hills. I have heard it said that, "Everything boils down to 'the Golden Rule,' and everything else is mere commentary."
