MANAGER'S REPORT

July 2021

To put it mildly, it has been a very difficult and costly start to our irrigation season. The crew and other service providers have repaired six separate 6" main line leaks and, unfortunately, we may not be done. Between main line leak repairs and countless other irrigation issues, hand watering of greens, new plantings etc. the crew has been very busy and for several weeks, working on weekends in an effort to catch-up. As you can imagine, this has left little time to address other needs that are not of an immediate nature.

Administration: April Kemerling has been working some long days also. She has been coordinating with our new bookkeeper, Kelly Harper of Balance Plus Bookkeeping, to finalize the transition to offsite bookkeeping. She has also been creating administrative efficiencies and organization while maintaining the many daily tasks the community requires. April would like to personally thank you all for your patience and understanding while she works through and learns the ins and outs of the office duties.

EFT Payments: To date, 130 of our 177 owners have signed up for the automatic EFT payment process that is be utilized for HOA monthly dues. This is very helpful, and we greatly appreciate your willingness to do so. At this point, the EFT system can only accommodate monthly HOA dues. Management, Balance Plus and the Board of Directors are pursuing other electronic payment options that can accommodate other reoccurring or annual expenses, including the upcoming (August) annual insurance premium payment, monthly utilities and for those who are reluctant to use the EFT process. More information will follow including some policy and procedure changes and a possible convenience fee or transaction fee required by payer services.

<u>Insurance Renewal:</u> The Adriel Hills Property and Liability Insurance Policy, along with several other related policies, are up for renewal on July 31st, 2021. We recently had a State

Farm senior underwriter and our local agent out for a site visit. Charlie Doggett, our resident insurance specialist, and I joined the State Farm representatives for the site visit. With the insurance market ups and downs, we hold our breath each year at renewal time. This year we are particularly concerned regarding building replacement costs due to the significant cost increase of building materials. The Adriel Hills property valuation is now almost forty million dollars. Of course, there are many other factors involved but with Charlie's years of experience, Adriel Hills has a solid program in place and State Farm who is a solid carrier, recognizes that. I'll spare you the details which are probably boring unless you're an insurance nerd like Charlie and me, but at this point, our renewal with State Farm looks favorable with fairly reasonable value and premium increases.

Insurance invoices are sent to all unit owners in early to mid-August and due within thirty days. As noted previously, it is our intent to have payment option methods in place for your insurance premium payment.

Building Repairs and Painting: Extensive building repairs have been completed on two large multi-unit buildings which means they are now ready to be repainted. Oh, there is a paint shortage and your usual product is not available and no estimated date of when it will back in stock. An upgraded product may be available, and if so, we will try to work with you on pricing. Due to our paint contractor's and Adriel Hills' long-time relationship with Sherwin Williams, it looks like we will get the two buildings currently under repair painted.

As much as we would like to report better news, Management and the Board of Directors are addressing the challenges in the most productive and efficient manner possible. We are adjusting and adapting with the intent to continue to meet as many goals as possible, and as close to budget as possible.

<u>Golf Tournament and Picnic:</u> The feedback has been outstanding from this year's golf tournament. Thank you to Mark Silhasek, Miranda Pratt, Jackie Tomlinson and Marcy Lockhart for volunteering their time to organize such a successful and fun event.

<u>Independence Day Holiday/Office Closure:</u> Administrative, Maintenance and Management Offices will be closed on July 5th in recognition of the 4th of July holiday. Regular business hours will resume on Tuesday, July 6th.

<u>Fireworks:</u> Fireworks utilized on Adriel Hills' property must be only those permitted by the Larimer County Fireworks Ordinance. Please refer to the more detailed rules that are available at; www.larimer.org/policies/fire_ban_ordinance.pdf. This is a county issue so please do not call a board member. You are encouraged to call the Larimer County Sheriff if somebody is not following the Larimer County Ordinance.

Announcements

Electronic Funds Transfer. The last several Newsletters alerted owners that Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) would soon be required for all residents. As you know, fees are due by the first of the month. EFT withdrawals occur around the fifth business day of the month.

Some residents have expressed reservations about EFT and a preference for using paper checks, concerned that EFT might make their bank accounts less secure. I and many other residents have used EFT, autopay, PayPal, Venmo, Remitly, and other banking and financial technologies (most of which use EFT in the background) ever since they became available with no problems. My only problems have come from the occasional credit card number theft and (rarely) from a lost check.

But to be sure that I was not being naive, I called my bank (Bank of America) to ask about paying by EFT versus checks. B of A told me that EFT methods were the most secure, with very sophisticated encryption and security measures and virtually no fraud or theft from accounts. It assured me that if in the rare circumstance that any loss occurred, the bank would immediately replace all funds lost. I learned that writing a check was the least secure payment method, with fraud of various kinds being all too common because fraudsters and thieves can change amounts, change signatures, steal blank checks, and even make new blank checks from used, written ones. They also can get address and account information from the checks themselves and use that for other scams. In addition, paper checks can be misplaced and lost in the mail. Fraud losses in such cases are covered, but it can be more difficult to prove that the fraud or theft occurred.

Check with your own bank to find out what it says about EFT payments.

Signing up for Adriel Hills' EFT is not difficult; just contact the office.

Note that at this point EFT is for monthly dues <u>only</u>. EFT is not used for the insurance premium or Adriel Ct. maintenance/utility payments because they are not monthly or vary in amounts. These items must be paid via personal check, cashier's check, or money order. Our new

bookkeeper, Kelly Harper, is working on adding debit and credit card payments options for those who would prefer that.

No less urgent than it was last month: Adriel Hills Website Manager or Designer Needed. The Adriel Hills website needs to be upgraded or redesigned soon. Without an upgrade or designing a new website, Adriel Hills website will no longer be available. The Board of Directors and the community are still looking for someone who can take the lead on this project, can research options and costs for review by Management and can ultimately present the findings to the board. Please contact the office if you are interested or know someone who might be.

Golf Course Safety: As attractive as the golf course is for frolicking, kids playing, picnicking, dog walking etc., any activities other than golfing are strictly prohibited under the Adriel Hills Rules and Regulations. This is for the safety of all and the sanctity of the game.

Colorado Taxes - Do you qualify for the homestead exemption?

Ralph sent along a flyer from The Group real estate and mortgage folks. Here is the pertinent information:

"According to Kiplinger, Colorado ranks among the 10 most tax-friendly states for retirees. And one of those friendly tax laws is built around real estate. [Ed. Note: Kiplinger ranks Colorado number 6 in tax friendliness, based in part on average sales tax rates. I calculate that given AH resident's eligibility for the low Larimer County sales tax for many purchases, the AH rank would be about number 3 in the country.]

"Colorado offers a property tax exemption for many seniors on their primary residence. *The Senior Property Tax Homestead Exemption tax credit is available to older adults who have lived in their homes for at least 10 years and were over the age of 65 prior to January 1, 2021, for taxes to be paid in 2022.* For those who qualify, the tax credit of 50% is available on the first \$200,000 of assessed value on the property....

"Qualified homeowners need to apply directly to their respective county assessor's office by **July 15**, and the exemption must be applied for only once. **Seniors that were previously approved do not need to reapply.** The exemption remains in effect for subsequent years as long as the property ownership and occupancy do not change. The surviving spouses of seniors who previously qualified may also apply."

If you have questions, give the county assessor's office a call. As reported last month, that office is extraordinarily responsive and helpful.

Clubhouse activities reminder

Wine and Unwind is every Tuesday from 4:00-6:00 p.m. Despite the name, it is not actually a wine group. Folks show up to socialize and bring whatever potables they prefer – coffee, tea, seltzer, wine, whiskey, whisky, aquavit, beer, Kool-Aid, water, kombucha, kvass, you name it. On nice days, they bring folding chairs and meet on the grass under the large trees behind the Kedron Drive four-plex. In unpleasant weather, they meet in the main room of the clubhouse.
